FAQs

When will the call for Late-Breaking ePoster abstracts be open?

The call will open April 1, 2025 for the EN25.

What is the submission deadline?

The deadline is May 5, 2025.

Do you accept abstracts that have been presented at other conferences?

Yes, you may submit your abstract for consideration.

Do I have to be a member to submit an abstract? What about if it's accepted?

No, authors are not required to be members.

If my poster is accepted, do I receive any discounts or financial assistance to attend conference?

No, financial assistance or discounts are not provided to authors of accepted ePosters.

Am I required to register for conference to present my work?

If accepted, at least one author must register and attend conference.

Overview of Submission Process

Authors

Only the primary author will submit all information for the ePoster abstract, author profile information, keywords, the abstract, a conflict-of-interest disclosure, and a statement of understanding. It is the primary author's responsibility to update coauthors on the status of the ePoster abstract submission.

Author Profile

All authors are to add their contact information, short biography statement, demographics and professional information (e.g., title, credentials). Primary authors will add co-authors to the ePoster in the online submission system.

Keywords

A minimum of three keywords or brief, keyword phrases (e.g., emergency nursing, quality improvement, blood culture contamination) are required. Do not enter the same keyword/phrase more than once.

Abstract

Abstracts must include only essential information for communicating the nature and results of the study. **Abstracts are limited to 500 words.** Abstracts not meeting the format requirements will not be reviewed:

- Literature reviews and systematic reviews are not accepted and will not be reviewed.
- Projects that have not started or have no preliminary data to report will not be reviewed.
- Abstracts must reflect either completed projects or projects in the final stages of completion with results available for inclusion in the poster (June, if accepted).
- Abstracts must be in narrative format only—no graphs, charts, tables, images, or bulleted lists allowed.
- Do not include personal identifying information or the facility/hospital name in the abstract.
- Do not cite references within your abstract content.

Only abstracts falling under Research will be considered for this Late-Breaking ePoster abstract submission period (**see page 2 for specific content to be included in the abstract**):

- **Research:** should include information about the process and results of a study aimed at generating new knowledge relative to a specific research question to advance clinical practice.

Statement of Understanding

This statement outlines the responsibilities of the primary author should the abstract be accepted for an ePoster presentation.

Late-Breaking Research ePoster Abstracts Information

Conflict of Interest and Financial Disclosure

Authors are in a position to control the content of educational activities and must disclose whether or not there is a conflict of interest. All conflicts of interest, including potential ones, will be reviewed by ENA prior to the conference and the primary author will be notified if anything further needs to be addressed. The primary author will complete this form.

Review Process

All abstracts for the Late-Breaking abstract submission period are blind-reviewed by members of the ENA Research Team.

Notification of Acceptance

Notifications will be sent in late May. If accepted, you will be asked to submit a PDF version of your poster in June (exact dates TBD). Exact poster specifications will be provided upon acceptance.

Abstract Content Guide

Research	
Purpose	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The scope or nature of the problem addressed is described. The purpose/research question is clearly stated.
Design	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The specific research study design is stated.
Sample	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The sample characteristics and the procedures for selecting participants with inclusion/exclusion criteria are described.
Setting	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The study/project setting is described (e.g., a teaching, urban level I trauma center).
Methods	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The study/project procedures, interventions, and evaluation methods or data analyses are described. Instruments or tools are described. Variables and measurements are defined.
Results	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The specific data that addresses the study purposes are presented. A summary of statistical analyses is included. For research studies in progress, preliminary analyses are presented.
Implications	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Reasoned conclusions based on the data presented are stated. Implications for emergency care are stated. Recommendations for managers, leaders, nurses and/or researchers are provided, as appropriate. For projects with preliminary data, anticipated outcomes and/or additional analyses that will be done when data collection is complete are stated.
In addition to the abstract requirements above, the following will also be incorporated into the review score:	
Written Expression	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The wording is clear, logical, interesting, accurate and concise.
Innovation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Project uses novel approaches and/or addresses novel or understudied questions.
